## ELEVEN IN JAIL; 10 GONE TO PEN AND 10 TO CO. ROAD GANG

With the sending of ten prisoners to the penitentiary the last week and an equal number to the county road gangs Sheriff Gallagher has reduced the county jail roster to ten men and one woman, making about the smallest number that have been held in the jail at one time since he has been sheriff. One of the men now held in jail, Bogus Jones, a negro, has been sentenced to ten years imprisonment in the penitentiary and will be transferred there at the first opportunity.

During the past term of the District Court nineteen convictions were secured against fourteen individuals and all were sentenced except three, who were given the suspended sentence. At the preceding term of court this year the same number of convictions on felony charges were secured with only five being sentenced and the remainder given the suspended sentence.

When the court term closed the jail contained thirty-four inmates and made possibly the largest number that have been held there at one time recently. Ten of those sentenced in the District Court were sent to the penitentiary and ten entered pleas of guilty in County Court to misdemeanor charges and were sent to the road gangs of the county to work out their fines and the court costs in their cases. The present roster is composed of four white men, six negroes and one negro woman.

Hill vs. unknown heirs of J. S. Veach et al., to remove cloud, et al. E. L. Reynolds Allen was granted a divorce against E. L. Allen.

## Tick Fever Has Caused Several Deaths in Denton Co. Livestock

Several deaths from Texas fever in the vicinity of Denton are reported. E. Cocanougher has lost five head recently on his place north of town. D. K. Allison, who has stock on the R. B. Wilson place, adjoining the Cocanougher pasture, has lost twenty-two head, it was reported Thursday, and C. J. Williams, on the old Garret place nearby, has lost several suspicious cases among his cattle. Mr. Cocanougher said.

## UNDERGROUND TANK DIDN'T BURST

Passed thru Lewisville Garage Fire with no Explosion.

The underground tank at the Raliff garage in Lewisville did not explode in the fire there Thursday, as had been reported, according to Bert Fowler of this city, who was in Lewisville Wednesday.

The upper part of the tank and pump was smashed, Mr. Fowler said, but the tank itself and its contents were found to be intact after the fire. The explosions were due to six iron barrels of gasoline, which the garage had just received. The tops of some of these were blown a hundred feet or more in the air.
