Man of Year to Be Honored at Jaycee Banquet Saturday

The "Man of the Year" of 1964 in Mansfield will be announced Saturday night at the second annual Jaycee Awards Night Banquet. An estimated 120 to 130 persons are expected to attend.

In addition to Jaycees who will be present, invitations have been extended to local school, civic and business leaders who have supported the organization since its founding two years ago.

To be recognized at the banquet will be the Jaycee associated organizations. These will include the Boy Scouts, the boxing team and the essay contest winner.

Tony Gorman will have his name added to the Jaycee athletic trophy for the third time. He was selected by the Jaycees as the outstanding basketball player in 1964. He previously had won the honor of the outstanding football player and the all-around athlete of 1963.

The football award this year will be awarded to a lineman, Bernard McJowan. Recipient of the all-around athlete honors will be Randy Philpot. All three young men will be honored at the banquet.

Location of the banquet has been changed from Erma Nash school as originally announced to the high school.

George Hawkes, executive editor of the Arlington Citizen-Journal and he Mansfield News-Mirror, will be guest speaker. Hawkes was named 1964 Man of the Year by the Arlington Chamber of Commerce.

A total of 24 nominations were received by the Jaycees for the Mansfield Man of the Year award.
