CROWDS GATHER FOR SNEED HABEAS CORPUS

POTTER COUNTY COURTHOUSE TOO SMALL TO HOLD ENORMOUS CROWDS.

NEW PHASE IS SUGGESTED

Sneed's Brother-in-law Summoned to Bring into Court "Breastplate Used for Protection"—Hercules Summoned by Defense.

Associated Press Dispatch. AMARILLO, Sept. 23.—Such great crowds gathered at the courthouse where the Sneed habeas corpus hearing was held this afternoon that the United States courts moved to the Woodmen of the World building.

The state and defense failed in a final effort to avoid a habeas corpus hearing by an agreement when the State insisted on Sneed's withdrawal of application for bail would be necessary.

A new phase of the case was suggested in the state subpoena for Terry Thompson, Sneed's brother-in-law. The subpoena ordered Thompson to bring into court "a certain breastplate used for protection of the human body." It is said that Sneed wanted the plate to protect himself in the encounter with Hercules.

It is also regarded as significant that the defense has summoned several of the holders as witnesses. The defense has also summoned a nurse, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram where Mrs. Sneed was reported to have been a patient five weeks this summer.

NO CLUE TO BOLD ROBBERS WHO GOT \$750 AT MART

MART, Sept. 23.—The officers so far have been unable to secure any clue to the three men who boldly entered the dry goods store of Gardner and Holloway Saturday night and got away with \$750, surprising the clerks and taking the money at the point of a pistol. The money taken was in currency, the robbers either overlooking or not wanting about \$800 in silver which was lying near the pile of currency.

INDIANA WOMAN SPENT 23 YEARS IN PRISON FOR ANOTHER'S CRIME

HUNTINGTON, Ind., Sept. 23.—Mrs. John Epps who served twenty-three years for the murder of her husband before being paroled, has been vindicated by the death-bed confession of Henry Epps, her husband's brother, who confessed to having poisoned his brother.

WEATHER BUREAU SAYS FROST IN PLAINS STATON

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—Cool weather throughout the country except in the Pacific states with frosts in the Plains states and upper Mississippi valley, according to the Weather Bureau's weekly forecast. Decidedly colder weather is expected toward the end of the week.

NEGRO ODD FELLOWS MET IN ATLANTA, GA.

Ford Crawford returned from Atlanta, Ga., Friday where he attended the convention of the negro Odd Fellow lodge which was held there for the second time in the South. The meeting is a bi-annual affair, and was attended this year by about 4,000 delegates. There were 50 Texas negroes in the delegation, and these returned by way of Tuskegee, Ala., where they visited the Booker T. Washington school. Ford Crawford was the only delegate from the Denton lodge.

MUST BRING ENTIRE SKIN TO GET BOUNTY

LAW FOR BOUNTY ON KILLING WILD ANIMALS IN EFFECT—CHANGE IN REQUIREMENTS.

Ignorance of the provisions of the new wild animal bounty law has cost some citizens their expected profits and one man who brought in the head and ears of two bobcats last week lost the \$10 he would have received if he had also brought in the entire skins. The old law merely required that the skins be brought in. The new law requires not only that the entire skin be brought, but in addition that the person make a long affidavit reciting that he and he alone killed the "varmint." This affidavit accompanied by the skin then goes before the Commissioners and they, in turn, issue a statement upon which the Clerk issues warrant in the proper sum.

Some state of bounty allowed is also somewhat different. But the list includes even some wild animals not indigenous to any part of the state, for instance, and also trophies. The state of prices set by the law follows:

OROZCO'S FORCES OPPOSITE LANGTRY

THOUSAND REBELS CLAIM TO BE READY TO INVADE STATE OF COAHUILA

WOMEN FLEE FROM LAS VAGAS

Two Hundred and Fifty Women and Children Flee from Las Vegas in Anticipation of Orozco's Approach—Teller Succeeds Huerta.

Associated Press Dispatch. LANGTRY, Sept. 23.—One thousand and five hundred rebels claiming to be under Orozco's command are camped opposite here in Mexico. J. R. and Walter Blocker, American cattlemen, coming here today importing cattle, claimed these rebels charged them import duty in the name of the Orozco government. The rebels said they were awaiting orders to march into the state of Coahuila.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN FLEE FROM LAS VAGAS EXPECTING OROZCO'S ARMY.

Associated Press Dispatch. DEL RIO, Sept. 23.—Two hundred and fifty women and children came here today from Las Vegas, opposite here in Mexico. They fled on the report that Orozco was approaching Las Vegas. Today, however, it is reported that Orozco has turned back and is marching westward away from Las Vegas.

GEN. TELLEZ SUCCEEDS GEN. HUERTA IN NORTH MEXICAN CAMPAIGN

CITY OF MEXICO, Sept. 23.—Gen. Teller has been placed in command of the Federal troops in the operations against the rebels in the northern part of Mexico, succeeding Gen. Huerta, who has been granted temporary leave of absence to have his eyes treated. The situation at Oaxaca has been relieved and the garrison strengthened by 400 men. Chapultepec was again sacked by Zapatistas.

A body of 100 Federals was defeated at La Babiya ranch, falling into an ambush.

REBEL GENERAL CAMPA IS CAPTURED AT TUCSON, ARIZ.

Associated Press Dispatch. TUCSON, Ariz., Sept. 23.—Rebel General Emilio Campa has been captured here.

JUDGE POTTER MAY HAVE TYPHOID FEVER

SPECIAL JUDGE HOPKINS WILL LIKELY PRESIDE OVER REMAINDER OF TERM.

NEGRO ENTERS GUILTY PLEA

Fred Burkes, charged with Theft of Horse from Corbett Wilson, Pleads Guilty—Swearingen Case Called.

Special Judge R. H. Hopkins it is likely will preside over the remainder of the August term of the Eleventh District court, Judge Clem B. Potter being still sick, according to word received Sunday, and it is believed he has typhoid fever, as the last reports showed that he was no better. He has been sick for nearly two weeks with recurring fever each day.

Judge Hopkins will be disqualified in one or more criminal cases due to come up at this term, however, and either they will have to be continued or another special judge decided upon by opposing counsel for the trial of the case in which the present Special Judge is disqualified by having represented the defense.

All of the remaining criminal cases on the docket were set for Monday except the special venire cases, which are set for succeeding days. The first jury trial for next Monday, being the first of that character coming up.

Sixth Week of Term Begins.

With a big crowd of witnesses and jurors the sixth week of the August term and the second week of the criminal term began Monday afternoon with Judge Hopkins presiding. The first case called was that of State vs. W. H. Swearingen, in which the State announced ready and the defense was given an hour to prepare an application for a continuance. The case of State vs. Louis Maynard, charged with burglary, was continued by the defense.

Frank Burkes, charged with theft of horse from Corbett Wilson at Krum, entered a plea of guilty to the offense. The jury selected to render a verdict was W. B. Nail, T. B. Fought, F. M. Coganough, W. C. Carlton, W. B. McKinney, S. A. Logan, A. B. Cain, E. J. Farrington, E. Yarnell, R. J. Freed, J. L. Wilson, J. H. Garbow.

HYGIENE CONGRESS FIFTEENTH SESSION

INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS TO RID HUMAN RACE OF DISEASE BEGINS TODAY.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—Fully 10,000 persons are here from all over the world for the fifteenth International Congress on Hygiene and Demography, whose purpose is to rid the human race of disease. President Taft in addressing the delegates today said that in the Panama canal zone the United States has demonstrated the possibility of developing bodily strength in tropical areas unknown to them hitherto.

TEACHERS IN INDIAN SCHOOLS MAY CONTINUE TO WEAR CHURCH GARB

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—The order of Secretary Fisher in revoking an order of former Commissioner Valentine in barring religious attire or insignia from Government Indian schools was upheld by President Taft in an executive order issued yesterday. The decision is that teachers now employed in the schools may continue to wear the garb of their religious orders, but persons heretofore entering the service may not.
